

Homework Policy

INTRODUCTORY STATEMENT

This revised policy was formulated in December 2007 through consultation with teachers, parents, Board of Management and a survey of pupils in the school.

RATIONALE FOR HOMEWORK POLICY

This revised policy has been devised at this time for the following reasons –

- To promote positive home/school communication.
- To establish good routines for pupils for independent learning.
- To address concerns over content and time spent by some children on homework.
- To ensure a balance between oral, reading and written homework.
- To address issues highlighted in a pupil survey.
- To review existing policy.

RELATIONSHIP TO CHARACTERISTIC SPIRIT OF SCHOOL

Our Lady of Good Counsel G.N.S. seeks to enable each child to develop her potential. We believe that the performance of homework encourages pupils to work in an independent way and take responsibility for their own learning.

AIMS

- To develop skills and self-discipline that will benefit the children, enhance their learning and increase their self-confidence through success.
- To reinforce/complete work done in class, thus establishing a good routine of homework.
- To promote a consistent approach across all levels in the school.
- To ensure differentiation for SEN pupils and to take account of different learning styles (multiple intelligences).
- To strengthen links between home and school i.e. "Homework, a bridge, not a battle."

HOMEWORK ROUTINES

The following are occasions when the children may not be given homework:

- Birthdays or nearest day
- Fridays
- Special rewards/Class or group treat/Homework pass
- Holiday times e.g. Christmas week
- Request of principal/priest etc.

Homework Journal (Dialann Scoile)

All classes from Rang 1-Rang 6 will use a Dialann Scoile

PARENTS are requested to sign each evening and supervise homework where possible.

Homework will generally be written down at the end of the day. (may vary in classes)

Who sets the homework?

- Classroom teachers
- SEN teachers

Checking Homework

Each class operates their own class system. A record is kept if homework is not done or poorly completed. A note will go home if this is consistent. Pupils may be asked to repeat the homework or complete work not done. Parents should use the Dialann Scoile (Homework notebook) to communicate with the teacher.

Monitoring Homework

In general teachers will check homework on a daily basis. However pupils at the senior end of the school (Rang 4-6) will work more independently and some items of homework will be checked only once/twice a week. Other items will be checked by the pupils themselves, under the direction of the teacher. We believe this to be a very valuable part of the learning process as it promotes responsibility and self-esteem.
